Jumblies follows guidelines from the Government, local authority Early Years and Public Health England, including public health advice on testing, self-isolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19.

We will ask for advice when necessary and will update our procedures accordingly. For childcare settings the threshold is:

• 5 children, pupils, students or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period; or • 10% of children, pupils, students or staff who are likely to have mixed closely test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period.

Cleaning of rooms and resources All resources that have been used are cleaned every day. Surfaces are wiped down regularly and at the end of every day. Floors are vacuumed and moped daily. All curtains and carpets are sprayed daily with antibacterial spray. Carpets are steam cleaned weekly. Toilets are cleaned regularly throughout the day Snack and lunch times Snack will be cut up in the kitchen by a member of staff wearing gloves or freshly washed hands	 Resources such as cushions and soft toys have been restricted and if in use are either washed or sprayed with antibac/viral spray. Children's free access to all toys has been restricted to allow us to keep on top of cleaning everything that has been used. Children are still given a choice of resources. All toys and resources are wiped down or washed every day. Toys from home are discouraged. Dressing up clothes and dolls clothes are washed daily. - Tables will be wiped with antibacterial spray.
- Snack plates will be passed around by staff, where possible the children will use tongs to pick up their pieces of fruit, if they cannot manage this by themselves, staff will support them.

PPE

Where the Risk Assessment identifies wearing of PPE as a requirement of the job (for example gloves for nappy changing), an adequate supply of these will be provided. Staff will be instructed on how to remove gloves carefully to reduce contamination and how to dispose of them safely.

Aprons, visors and face masks are available, these should be used when looking after a child who becomes unwell whilst at nursery.

Symptoms of Covid-19

If anyone becomes unwell with a new, continuous cough or a temperature in Nursery they must be sent home and advised to follow the staying at home guidance.

If a child is awaiting collection, they should be moved into the outside or wet area. If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people.

- wearing of gloves is not a substitute for good hand washing and to ensure that aprons, gloves and mask are destroyed after each use.
- Managers to ensure sufficient availability of PPE.

Children with a temperature over 37.8

and/or a new persistent cough will not be allowed in the nursery.

Children's well being will be closely observed throughout the day. If any concerns arise the

throughout the day. If any concerns arise the parent/carer will be contacted and asked to pick up the child immediately.

Line managers will offer support to staff who are affected by Coronavirus or has a family member affected. All staff are responsible to be aware of changes in children's health throughout the day and to inform the person in charge.

If children need to go to the bathroom The bathroom should be cleaned and while waiting to be collected, they disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone should use a separate bathroom if possible, which will be cleaned thoroughly before else. another person uses it. In an emergency, call 999 if they are seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk. Do not visit the GP, pharmacy, urgent care centre or a hospital. If a member of staff has helped someone who was taken unwell with a new, continuous cough or a high temperature, they do not need to go home unless they develop symptoms themselves. They should wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after any contact with someone who is unwell.
